Sentence Fragments

A sentence fragment is a group of words that is only a part of a sentence. Since a fragment is not the whole thing, it won't be as useful to you as it could be. Just as a fragment of a bowl can't hold much food, a fragment of a sentence may not communicate what you want to say.

To be complete, a sentence must have (1) a subject, (2) a verb, and (3) express a complete thought. If any of these pieces are missing, the group of words is a fragment rather than a complete sentence.

FRAGMENT	Is one of the largest snakes. [The subject is missing. <i>What</i> is one of the largest snakes?]
SENTENCE	The anaconda is one of the largest snakes.
FRAGMENT	Anacondas to a length of thirty feet. [The verb is missing. <i>What</i> do they do to a length of thirty feet?]
SENTENCE	Anacondas can grow to a length of thirty feet.
FRAGMENT	Although these snakes aren't poisonous. [This has a subject and a verb, but it doesn't express a complete thought.]
SENTENCE	Although these snakes aren't poisonous, their size makes them dangerous.
To find out if what	you've written is a fragment, ask yourself the following questions:

- 1. Does the group of words have a subject?
- 2. Does the group of words have a verb?
- 3. Does the group of words express a complete thought?

If even one of your answers is "no," then you have a fragment.
